Cultural Corner

Mother's Day

Mother's Day is celebrated on the second Sunday in May. It celebrates the most important women in our lives. In the United States children sometimes make their mothers breakfast in bed. They also clean house and make cards to honor their mothers. Mother's Day is celebrated in many other countries all over the world including Canada, Mexico, and England.

Mother's Day celebrations can be seen in ancient times. In Ancient Greece the Greeks celebrated Rhea, the mother of six important gods and goddesses. In Ancient Rome her name was Cybele. In 17th century England there was a custom called Mothering Sunday. People would visit the church where they were baptized, the "mother church," and would also visit their own mothers bringing cakes and gifts.

In the United States the idea for Mother's Day was started by Anna M. Jarvis of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania after her mother died in 1906. Jarvis held a memorial service for her mother and asked everyone to wear a white carnation, her mother's favorite flower. After this service she felt that all mothers needed a special day. She wanted people to remember the sacrifices their mothers made. She formed a committee called the Mother's Day International Association. This group wrote letters to editors of newspapers, and spoke to politicians and church leaders.

In 1910 West Virginia became the first state to recognize Mother's Day. Finally, in 1914 President Woodrow Wilson declared Mother's Day a national holiday. Today people still wear carnations to honor their mothers, pink or red if their mothers are still living and white if they have died.
